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Elizabeth Herrmann Miklus Built Financial Services Career on Perseverance and Grit -Class of 1973-

The year was 1976 when Elizabeth Miklus, Assistant Vice President, Business Development Associate, Morgan Stanley, was a junior in college studying Art Education and struggling to get by. She was working three jobs on campus, riding a bike between her apartment, which she couldn't afford, to get to classes and her campus jobs, and strapped with student loans. It would be an understatement to say that this was a very difficult period for this Little Silver native. Fast forward to her current role at Morgan Stanley, most observers would never know the grit and determination that it took for Elizabeth to reach the pinnacle of her career. We recently sat down with Elizabeth to reflect on her career path, her time at RBC, and what insights she could share with other Caseys.

Elizabeth's entry into a financial career in 1976 was most influenced by her father, Joseph C. Herrmann, who is also an RBC alumni, class of 1949. He was a stockbroker in Manhattan and Elizabeth needed a job so he put his daughter to work typing commodity invoices (on a typewriter with no delete button or spell check). At that time, she didn't even fully understand what the commodities market was but she was a hard worker and determined to do the best she could.

What quickly became apparent to anyone around Elizabeth was that she proved her worth with drive and ambition in a time that was incredibly difficult for a female in the world of finance. Much has changed, of course, but as Elizabeth reflects upon her experiences on Wall Street one immediately appreciates her laser-focus on excellence and learning, not allowing distractions and hurdles to deter her along the way.

A female mentor noticed and invited Elizabeth to join her on the newly formed heating oil trading desk which sounded fascinating. “This was a pivotal point in my career. I recognized how impactful mentors can be and how every experience along the way is an opportunity to learn.” The year was 1980 and there was not an abundance of women working in the heating oil futures business, so Elizabeth and her fellow female heating oil traders joined forces to support one another, especially when they attended industry events. “I remember us being at a trade show and intentionally wearing very high heels to physically stand above the oil men from Texas. This was one small gesture to ensure we were on equal footing with the men.”

“This was a period of great transition for women in the workplace. I’m proud to say that we helped pave the way for many of the benefits that we see today. There was little understanding for mothers, let alone single-mothers, which I was at the time.”

Elizabeth continues, “I never had the option to give up. I took the bumps and bruises along the way and became brave because I had to. I learned to toughen-up, understand that I had worth and when I knew I deserved a raise, I asked for it. When I didn’t get it, I moved on even switching firms. I knew I had made the right decision when 16 months later, I was invited back to the firm I left.”

Today, Elizabeth has her Series 3, Series 7, Series 65 and Series 66, as well as her NJ insurance license. She thrives on building relationships with clients. She is proud of how Morgan Stanley supports its employees and their career paths, aligning goals and dreams to help ensure employees have meaningful, impactful careers. Flexibility, support, and open communications are mainstays.
